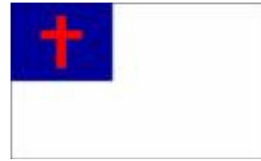

**"I pledge allegiance to the Christian Flag
and to the Savior for whose kingdom it stands.
One brotherhood, uniting all Christians, in service and love."**

I have already shared with some pastors during devotion at the January fellowship about the Christian Flag. After some prayer, it is on my heart to share this with all of you. I’m certain that many of you have seen the flag and probably have one in your church. It usually resides to the front of the church only to be used, or recognized, during bible school or the occasional question.

The concept for the Christian Flag was first designed in 1897 in Brooklyn, New York. Charles Overton was the Sunday School Superintendent of Brighton Chapel, where he was awaiting a guest speaker. The speaker was a no show. Overton, needing to fill the vacant spot, spoke to the gathered students about a Christian Flag and what it would look like and represent. Thus the concept for the Christian Flag was born. In 1907, the first flag was fashioned with the help of Ralph Diffendorfer.

The flag is on a white canton, with a blue square in the upper left corner and a red cross inside. The white represents purity. Our sins being red as scarlet but upon salvation are white as snow (Isaiah 1:18). The blue represents the royalty of Christ as the King of Kings and Lord of Lords (Revelation 17:14). The red cross represents the once blood shed sacrifice for our sins (Hebrews 10:12).

Though relatively only a 100 years old, the Christian Flag flies as the most unique of all flags. Most flags represent power or independence, the Christian Flag neither. It does not promote division, denomination, or congregational size, it shows no favoritism. Rather, it promotes unity. You might ask: How can something promote unity amongst all the churches and Christians in the entire world? It is the Blood of Christ that unites us all.

Because of His Blood I can worship in unity with other believers. However, many times we try to excluded ourselves by our petty disbeliefs and practices and form a body, call it a church, wave the Christian Flag and say I am glad I’m saved. However Ephesians 4:3-6 reads, “Endeavoring to keep the unity of the Spirit in the bond of peace. *There is* one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; One Lord, one faith, one baptism, One God and Father of all, who *is* above all, and through all, and in you all.”

If we deny unity in Christ, we are denying what Jesus Himself tried to establish. The Scribes, Pharisees, and Saducees were the primary ones who thought themselves to be so close to God and Jesus called them hypocrites. They would not fellowship with the lost, the diseased or the poor, they were concerned about themselves. If unity wasn’t important, then why did Christ spend so much time on it? You might say that was then and this is now, or we have to try new strategies, or something fun, or I don’t have time.

Then I want to remind you of the Apostles in Acts 2. They were in one accord in one place. To define accord, means together in agreeing harmony. If we a New Testament church and fulfilling the Great Commission we must be together, work together, and

fellowship together. Isn't this what the Christian Flag represents? Unity, harmony, and togetherness in Christ? Does the pledge not read, "One brotherhood, uniting all Christians in service and in love"?

The result of the Apostles being together in unity was the Spirit of God filled them all; it sat on each of them. Read on through Acts 2 and see more results, they worked together, preached and taught and the ending result of chapter 2, 3,000 souls were saved in that one day. What a revival time!

The conclusion: From this you might just have learned a little history on the Christian Flag and what it represents. But I hope you have a new desire to work together and for God. Lets all turn to God and brotherhood the Christian Flag represents. Let's work for God and see our people saved, through visitation, prayer, fellowship, revival, hammer and nail work or whatever it takes. Let's show Scott County the unity and bond we have in Christ and fulfill the Great Commission. Grace, peace and mercy, unto you from God the Father and our Lord Jesus Christ. (Written by Rev. Each year, we honor the life and work of Annie Walker Armstrong (1850-1938) when we give to the annual offering for North American missions named after her. As a tireless servant of God and a contagious advocate and supporter of mission efforts throughout the world, Annie Armstrong led women to unite in mission endeavors that ultimately led to the formation of Woman's Missionary Union, for which she served as the first corresponding secretary.

Her hands held her own Bible as she studied to know how best to share God's love with others. And, most important, Annie was a woman of prayer, folding her hands in prayer to intercede for the missionaries and for those they were helping discover Christ.

Annie rallied churches to give more, pray more, and do more for reaching people for Christ. As we continue to unite to make her vision a reality in North America today, we can be confident that her legacy will also be ours.

Through our gifts to the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering, our SBC missions personnel are enabled to share the good news of Jesus Christ. Because every dollar given to the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goes directly to support missionaries and their ministries, Southern Baptists are confident offering gifts are an investment in eternity.

- **Mission Outreach Opportunity in Venice, Louisiana.** The date for this mission trip is April 5-12, 2008. Travel is at the expense of individual Mission Team Members. Housing will be at Port Sulphur Baptist Church, Port Sulphur, LA. Port Sulphur is about 45 miles southeast of New Orleans on the Mississippi delta. Bunkhouse trailers (each can accommodate up to 24 persons) are on site. The average cost per volunteer is \$20.00 per week. Housing for 24 people has been secured for these dates. The work is in Venice, LA. Venice is about 30 miles below Port Sulphur. The church a Venice is need of a complete cleanout. At the present time the drywall and insulation has been removed. The studs and ceiling joists are still in place. The HVAC is still in place. All this needs to be torn out as well as the metal on the walls of the church. The grounds outside the church needs to be cleaned up to the point it could be mowed. The Parsonage needs to be prepared for rebuild. At the same time people are needed to canvass the area as would be done for a new church start. The long term goal is to recover and rebuild at least a portion of the church at Venice. This would provide a platform for disaster recovery and community outreach. I do not know of any materials that would be needed. We would need to bring basic tools. Crowbars hammers pry bars, wheelbarrows, shovels, and push brooms. Battery operated drills and bits are needed to remove the metal. The team will have its own cooks and at this time plans to use the facilities at Port Sulphur for preparing meals. A small IGA grocery and a Dollar General store are now open in Port Sulphur. Supplies could be purchased at Belle Chase about 40 miles north of Port Sulphur. For more information, contact Patrick Johnson at 479-2249 or by e-mail at patrickj@mounet.com.
- **Mission Opportunity Outreach in Port Sulphur, LA.** Members from First Church in Nickelsville will be traveling to Port Sulphur, LA during the month of April to assist in rebuilding the homes of those displaced by Hurricane Katrina.
